



We have had a super busy start to the spring term exploring our topic of Superheroes! From Spiderman and Batman to real-world superheroes such as police, nurses and farmers and the people who help us every day, we have had lots of fun learning through our play.

We started the term by turning ourselves into Superheroes and making a colourful Superhero mask.













We have been lucky enough to have some visitors come into preschool and talk about their jobs and what they do every day. Our first visitors were two local PCSOs, all the children loved trying on the police hat and sitting in the police car. They even put the lights and sirens on for them!







Following the visit the children made their own police car.











We had a visit from a nurse who showed the children how to put on a bandage, a sling and they even got to use a stethoscope to listen to each other's heart beats.









All the children were super excited when we had our final visitor come to preschool this week. We were lucky enough to have a visit from a farmer, who not only brought his tractor for the children to sit in, but he also brought two sheep and two piglets! The children were very careful when stroking the piglets and even got to feed the sheep.









As always, the children have enjoyed looking at books and listening to stories.







We have explored mixing colours when painting some beautiful pictures.









During the first half of the spring term both preschool and Merlin class have enjoyed 'Fun Fridays' when we have opened the doors between the two classrooms and the children have been free to explore and play. Lots of fun has been had by all and we look forward to continuing this during the next half term!

Merlin Class



Merlin Class have enjoyed spending the last 6 weeks learning about 'Creatures Big and Small'. We have appreciated a wide selection of books as part of our topic including *The Gruffalo*,

Rumble in the Jungle and Tyrannosaurus Drip, as well as looking at non-fiction books.

The children have enjoyed learning about lots of different animal facts, including investigating their habitats and diets. Merlin Class have learnt lots of new vocabulary which they have passionately shared with other adults across the school – super learning, Merlins!



Our weekly welly walks are back in full swing! Despite the flooding, wind and frost, the children have enjoyed embarking on local adventures to observe the impact of weather on our environment as well as keeping our eyes peeled for any animals, in keeping with our learning topic.



Reading and phonics remains a vital learning experience for all Merlins. The children have all made remarkable progress with their phonics and are progressing rapidly with their reading. We have been busy learning lots of digraphs this half-term which has helped us to become a lot more independent with our writing. The children are

reading and writing longer words, and this is showcased through their written work. It is lovely to see the children record down their own ideas by confidently applying their phonics knowledge.

In Maths, we have been learning a variety of different strategies to enable us to add and subtract two numbers from each other. We have been using lots of different tools to help us, including ten-frames, number lines, drawings and our fingers.



The children have enjoyed learning number facts in relation to addition and subtraction and have mastered solving number problems! Next half term will see us revisit composition of numbers to 10 and exploring even and odd numbers.

There has been lots of great learning going on this half term which has been sure to keep us all busy! The children are working incredibly hard and should be proud of all that they have achieved during the first half of

their first year at school!

Pendragon Class



This half term, Pendragon have been exploring traditional tales. The children have enjoyed becoming familiar with different stories and creating their own version of the Three Little Pigs. They had some super ideas as to how to make their own story including changing the pigs to koala bears, sheep and frogs. We have also been reading the story Cinderella and have been focusing on writing setting descriptions, letters to the stepmother and recounting the story.





To help the children get into character, we used role play to explore the character of Cinderella, before writing letters to the stepmother to explain how we were feeling.




In maths, we continue to look at addition and subtraction, using practical resources to support our learning as much as possible. We have also looked at doubling and halving, money and place value.

We've priced items in a shop so the children could

practice finding the correct coins to pay for them and used number beads and

counters to help us counting in 5s and 10s.




around the school and what materials they are made from, as well as looking at their properties.



We also carried out an investigation to find the best material for the three little pigs to build their house from; the children then tested their houses to see whether they were strong enough to survive the huffs and puffs of the big bad wolf!

In addition to learning about everyday materials, the children have also been enjoying outdoor learning this half

term with Mrs Crang and Mrs Hewlett.



Finally, we must say a big thank you to Mrs Crang for all her support with Pendragon. Mrs Crang will be stepping back from her role as class teaching assistant but will continue to support the school in delivering her Environment Education lessons on Friday afternoons - thank you Mrs Crang!









King Afthuf Class



We have reached the halfway point of the year and have taken this opportunity to reflect on how much the children have learnt so far. Our main topic for this half term has been the Egyptians, which the children have enjoyed greatly, and it has been a pleasure to see so many of them taking on their own research projects and showing such a keen interest in this ancient civilisation. We are very much looking forward to our Egyptian topic day on Friday 1st March!



In our history lessons, the children have explored the gift of the river Nile and why it was so essential for survival in Ancient Egypt. They have looked at the process of mummification, even getting to mummify Mrs Elsworth and Mrs Collins! They have also researched the famous Egyptologist Howard Carter, who was responsible for the discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb, as well as explored the hieroglyphic writing system used by the ancient Egyptians. As well as this, they have looked at some of the key beliefs of the Egyptian gods and goddesses.



The children have loved our art unit this half term, which has linked to the Egyptians; they nave looked at some popular Egyptian patterns and symbols and used these to create a scroll, made from their own hand made version of papyrus paper.

We have also linked our writing to the Egyptians, with a primarily non-fiction focus; we have written a non-chronological report about this fascinating civilisation, a newspaper report about the discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb, a diary entry from the perspective of Howard Carter and a retelling of the Legend of Isis and Osiris. We have also been working hard on our grammatical features, specifically using conjunctions and adverbials of time,



In maths, we have consolidated our learning on multiplication and division, before moving on to money. We have worked on recognising the value of different coins and notes, counted money in pounds and pence, compared amounts and have calculated change. As well as this, we have explored different ways of presenting data, including in a tally, pictogram, bar chart, table and block diagram, for our statistics unit.



'Everyday Materials' has been our focus in Science; we have explored the different uses properties and classifications of materials, looked at how they can change shape or be made into new materials, and we have investigated the process of recycling.



In RE, Judaism has been our key religion for this term and we have looked at some of the main festivals and celebrations, such as Rosh Hashana, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Shabbat as well as Bat and Bar Mitzvahs. Next half term, we will continue to explore some of the key beliefs and elements of Judaism, by looking at their religious texts and places of worship.

We are looking forward to another busy half term for Spring 2 and have lots of enrichment activities coming up, including our Egyptians topic day, World Book Day and our class trip to Cheddar Gorge (more information to follow shortly)!

Excalibur Class



Excalibur Class studied the digestive system in science this term. We have discovered what our digestive system looks like below the surface of our skin and learnt the correct names for those parts that play a vital part in our digestion of foods and fluids.



Later in the term, we found out the function of each of the organs and body

parts in the digestive system. Most recently, we have set up an experiment to investigate the affect of different liquids/drinks

on our teeth. We immersed 5 eggs in a variety of liquids and are recording our observations on how each of the liquids are affecting the shell of the egg each day...hopefully your children will be coming home at the end of this term telling you all about the healthy balance of liquids they can drink, based on the results of our egg-speriment!




In our music lessons this term, we have been refining our composition and group playing skills, using the glockenspiel. We started with focusing on playing the notes D, E and F and now have introduced a fourth note, C. It is taking a great deal of concentration to play in time, but we are starting to sound really good!



We have covered a range of topics in maths so far this term, however the Year 5s particularly enjoyed learning about square and cube numbers in maths lessons, whilst the Year 4s were practising counting in 6,7,9,25 and 1000, along with plenty of challenges and reasoning based on these themes.



Last week, our Year 4 children joined other local schools at Ansford for an afternoon of team building activities. As you can see from the photos, the children had lots of fun and were faced with several challenges which led to some head-scratching!!











Computing this half-term has been based on image composition and editing. When working with Mr Gordon, children have been learning about the crop, clone and colour saturation tools. The class have discussed the uses of these as well as the e-safety messages of understanding how pictures can be manipulated such as those well-illustrated in the Dove Skincare films – well worth a look to start a conversation with your children!

Mr Plumbley has been crafting helmets in the style of that found at Sutton Hoo in 1938. The children are at the first-fitting stage of their projects, which will continue on Friday afternoons after the half-term.

Next term, we will continue to read about the adventures and destiny of Magnus in our class reading book 'Anglo-Saxon boy' by Tony Bradman, which will also support the children's history topic based on the Anglo Saxons and Scots.

Lancelot Class

Over the course of this term, Lancelot have been studying Crime and Punishment. We have been learning about this topic through the ages, starting with the Romans and culminating in the Victorian prisoner experience. In between, we have debated Anglo-Saxon crimes, written diary entries as a prisoner, described punishments from the Tudor era and even re-enacted hard labour tasks



that prisoners would experience. Don't forget we have our school trip coming up at Shepton Mallet Prison too!



In writing this half term, we focused on The Lucky Dip: writing a narrative based on this short video. We have also read Holes by Louis Sachar, which has inspired a diary entry, a non-chronological report and we will continue to write about this fantastic novel in the coming weeks.

This term in Ukulele lessons Lancelot have been learning a variety of songs, in different styles; Three little Birds, How Far I'll Go and Stitches. Children have all really grasped the concept of tablature notation, playing short musical phrases from TV and film; themes such as Jurassic Park, Spiderman, Bluey and The Simpsons. They have been learning about how to read a range of rhythmic notation and how to apply that to their playing as well as beginning to write their own musical scores!

In our language lessons this term we have received letters and cards from our pen pals in France and Mexico. The children have used their prior knowledge and the use of bilingual dictionaries to help translate these letters.







We have also been developing our conversational skills by adding questions to add detail. As a cross curricular activity, we looked at the Belgium artist Ben Heine and his concept of Pencil V Camera. With a photograph of a famous French landmark the children manipulated the photo and added their own artistic flair!

In PE, the class have been working extremely hard in hockey with Mr Gallagher. Focusing on skills such as

dribbling, stopping the

ball, passing and using the reverse stick technique to dribble. They have been doing tag rugby with Mr Bunter. This culminated with a great tag rugby tournament for the school and a hockey festival which will be played next term.

Thank you for all the parents who came to our 'Are you smarter than your 10-year-old?" quiz. It was a great success and confirmed that the parents know more than the children, at this point in the

Online safety tips for children in primary school





What are children doing online?

Children in this age group spend most of their online time using video sharing platforms, watching TV or films and using messaging sites or apps with many also playing games and using social media.

Online safety issues that children can come across:



Cyberbullying: this is behaviour meant to hurt another person that happens more than once. Cyberbullying happens online, at school or at home.

Grooming: this is when an adult or usually older child builds trust with your child to trick them into doing something sexual, illegal or extreme.



Misinformation: when fake information is shared online, your child might not realise it isn't true. This could harm them, especially if it is a dangerous experiment they do at home.

Inappropriate content: videos, images and games that might be violent or have sexual content are not appropriate from primary school children.



Screen time: children sometimes spend too long on their devices without taking breaks. Or they might not know how to use their devices in

healthy ways. This can lead to sleep, behaviour and other problems.



If your child has special educational needs or disabilities (SEND), they may need extra support to stay safe online. These resources can help:

Stay safe checklist to support children:



Talk about their online lives: ask them what kinds of apps they use or games they play and what they like to do online. If your child knows you're interested in their online life, they are more likely to come to you if something goes wrong.



Set boundaries: together, decide what your child can and can't do online. Think about what times they can go online, how long they can spend online and what kinds of app/platforms/sites they can use to stay safe.



Set parental controls: parental controls help manage who can talk to your child online, what content they can see or how much time they spend online. Setting them can help keep them safe. Set parental controls on different devices, including broadband and mobile networks.



Explore features together: if your child wants to play a new game or use a new app, first use it together. See what they can do on the platform to check if it's suitable for their age. Check to see if there are safety settings or parental controls you can set. This will also show them you're interested in their online lives.



Show them safety features: to help them stay safe online, apps and platforms have different ways to stop online hate or inappropriate content. Get familiar with report, block and other features to help your child stay in control of their online safety.

Dear parents and guardians,

Stop the spread of coughs, colds and other infections this winter

As is usual during winter months, UKHSA are seeing increasing levels of winter illnesses including flu, COVID-19 and other illnesses like whooping cough and measles in some areas outside the South West.

We are writing to share simple steps everyone can take to reduce infections spreading in the community – helping children make a healthy start to the year and minimising the impact of illness on attendance.

What infections are circulating in the South West?

At this time of year, other types of illnesses that circulate are respiratory infections (colds, covid, flu) and whooping cough, scarlet fever and chickenpox, as cases usually peak in late winter and early spring.

Symptoms of <u>respiratory infections</u> can include a runny nose, high temperature, cough and sore throat. For most children, these illnesses will not be serious, they soon recover.

Symptoms of <u>scarlet fever</u> include sore throat, fever, swollen neck glands, a bumpy rash on the tummy, flushed cheeks and 'strawberry tongue'. If you suspect your child has scarlet fever, contact your local GP; and if diagnosed stay away from nursery or school for 24 hours after the first dose of antibiotics.

Chickenpox is highly contagious, with the most common symptom being an itchy, spotty rash. If your child has chickenpox, keep them off school until all the spots have crusted over.

Whooping cough starts with cold like symptoms and progresses to bouts of coughing which may make a 'whoop' sound (a gasp for breath)

Measles

There are currently increased levels of measles in the West Midlands affecting the school age population, with some children needing hospitalisation. Although we are currently seeing low numbers of measles cases, because measles is highly infectious, we are likely to see cases of measles in the South West in the coming months.

We therefore urge parents to get their children up to date with the MMR vaccination. This is the best form of defence against measles and has the added advantage of also preventing rubella and mumps.

Check your child's red book and make an appointment with your GP surgery to catch up on missed doses.

What can I do to prevent infections?

Teach good hygiene habits

Encouraging good hand-washing habits is one of the most effective ways to stop the spread. Regularly wash hands in soap and warm water for 20 seconds.

Using a tissue to catch coughs and sneezes, binning it and then washing hands will help prevent infection from spreading.

Our <u>e-bug</u> resources for all ages can help you to explain and discuss hygiene habits – and why they are important – to your child or teenager.

Spot the signs of when to keep your child at home

While children are encouraged to stay in education or childcare with symptoms such as a runny nose, sore throat or slight cough (if otherwise well and do not have a high temperature), children should stay home from school or nursery if they're displaying the following symptoms:

- If your child has a fever and is unwell, they should stay home from school or nursery until the fever has passed and they are well enough to attend.
- If your child has diarrhoea and/or vomiting, they should stay off school or nursery
 for at least 48 hours after their symptoms clear up this will help stop the spread of
 stomach bugs.

Get vaccinated

Vaccination offers the best protection against many infections, including flu, measles and whooping cough. Please make sure that you and your children are up to date with their vaccines.

Being up to date with vaccinations, especially MMR and whooping cough, is also important for parents or staff who are pregnant. You can take a look at the <u>childhood vaccination</u> schedule to make sure your child is up to date with all their vaccinations.
