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| Read the poem, The Language of Cat by Rachel Rooney. (pg 4) Perform the poem – just for yourself if you like, or for someone in your house. Try to make the cat's movements and attitude part of your performance. Maybe you could learn part or all of the poem by heart. You can find Rachel Rooney reading her poem here: https://vimeo.com/ 162519257 Answer the questions. | Look carefully at the picture. The cat in the picture probably has the same qualities as the ones described in Rachel Rooney's poem. Let's pretend you meet the cat in the picture. You meet it on the street late one night, just as it is about to climb up to the rooftops. You ask it the questions on page 5 and it answers in your language. Write down the answers it gives. Write your replies in full sentences. | Prepositions are those words that often help when we are writing about the position of an object or person – words like: in, on, up, down, out, over, under, round, through, past, along, behind, after, before, inside. Maybe Paddypaws can talk to you or has some secret way of communicating. Or maybe the Cat-Burglar trips over Paddypaws' tail! See what ideas you can think of and choose the best one. Plan the story. | Use your plan from yesterday to write your story. You could begin: Late last Tuesday, my cat, Paddypaws, was out for her usual nightly prowl, when Consider organising your ideas into chapters, considering a clear beginning, middle and end. Write it out in your best handwriting, correcting any spelling or grammar mistakes. Illustrate your story. You could even make it into a book with a front cover. Make sure you make a note of any spellings you needed to correct and practise them regularly, especially common words. | Usually we would dress up as your favourite character from a book, so I hope everyone will still take part in this tradition!
